An Overview on the Importance of Child Observation and Assessment

In this session, participants will receive an overview of child observation and assessment along with information on why we observe children, the different observation types, screenings, assessments, the benefits, and the tools needed to perform the observation and assessments.

Asking the Right Questions: The Importance of Open-Ended Questions

Open-ended questions are a great way to build relationships, and can be used as a tool to observe the child's development. In this session we will be discussing the differences between closed and open-ended questions, the benefits of using open-ended questions, and where to start incorporating suggested strategies within your classroom.

Asset Mapping

This training will go over the importance of asset mapping in the early education field, what it is, and how to implement it.

Block Play: Building Up the Whole Child

This session offers participants the opportunity to learn the importance and value of block play in early childhood as well as some creative DIY ways to make their own blocks.

Building a Firm Foundation with TRAILS One Block at a Time

In this series for family childcare providers, participants will receive an overview of the West Virginia Elements of Family Child Care Series. There are four 1-hour sessions that discuss how children grow, organizing a program, how children learn, and building relationships.

*There are technical assistance visits in addition to the sessions to support learning.

Building Partnerships with Families

In this training session, we will learn how to turn a relationship with families into a partnership. We will discuss why this is so important and the effects it has on child development. We will also look at the latest research on parent involvement and ways to involve parents in your program.

Conflict Resolution

Are you constantly dealing with conflict in your classroom? Do you feel that all you are saying is, "No!" and "Stop that!" Do you spend a great deal of time resolving conflict in your room? If so, this training is for you. During this session, participants will be introduced to the definition of conflict from a child's perspective. We will discuss various struggles that are occurring in the classroom, and together, we will deliberate problem solving strategies to assist with those classroom conflicts.

Container Baby Syndrome

This training explores the effects of Container Baby Syndrome with a focus on the adverse developmental impacts it has on infants. Infant Toddler caregivers will learn what restrictive equipment is, what developmental delays to look for, and how to prevent the over use of containers.

Creative Curriculum 101

This course will help participants better understand creative curriculum by discussing the research behind the foundation of Creative Curriculum, as well as exploring in depth the key points of The Creative Curriculum's framework.

Cultural Awareness in an ECE Environment

This training will discuss the importance of cultural awareness in an early childhood educational program as well as strategies to incorporate multiculturalism into the program.

Developmentally Appropriate Practice in Preschool

In this 2-part mini-series we will discuss the updated research from NAEYC's newest DAP Statement. We will become familiar with the principles, guidelines, and considerations of DAP; learn how to build a developmentally appropriate classroom for preschoolers; and what changes to make in our environments that will also answer the questions of 'Is circle time developmentally appropriate?' and 'How important is play?' The proof of learning will be a one-hour TA visit about implementing DAP in your classroom.

Director's Toolbox



The Director's Toolbox is a 7-week module series that is intended solely for administrators in a child care center or facility. This program is designed to improve the quality of early care and education for children in West Virginia. Director's Toolbox is worth 14 hours of WV STARS credit.

Family Child Care Positive Behavior Intervention and Support Series (FCCPBIS)



The Family Child Care Positive Behavior Intervention and Support Series focuses on social and emotional support in all childcare settings. This six-hour course is based on the Pyramid Model and will discuss evidencebased interventions that promote social, emotional, and behavioral development.

Friendship Skills: How to Promote Prosocial Behaviors

In this session, we will discuss how simply telling children to "be a good friend" or to "be nice" does not lead to children comprehending the meaning behind these words. We need to be intentional and set the learning in motion, explaining to children how to be a good friend. By creating opportunities to model prosocial skills and having developmentally appropriate expectations, caregivers will help introduce the way for positive experiences and hopefully some lasting friendships along the way.

Get the Scoop on Soutron! TRAILS is Online

This session will provide current and future TRAILS participants with the opportunity to learn about the Soutron platform and utilize the online service to make their TRAILS choices.

Inspiring Spaces = Learning Places

When children walk into your classroom what do they see? Is the space inviting, warm, clean, fun and well organized or cluttered, dirty and chaotic? This session will help you see the importance of making your classroom an inspiring space full of wonder, excitement and engaging learning opportunities!

Let's Tell It Again! The Importance of Retelling Stories

This session will focus on the art of storytelling and the importance of fostering retelling skills in young children to develop good oral language, vocabulary, and comprehension.

Bringing Diversity to Your Learning Environment

"No, Stop, Be Careful!" Why Children Need Risky Play

Simply saying the words "risky play" can make some people nervous. However, risky play is something children are designed to do. When children can take part in risky play, they may experience new emotions, self-awareness, and even learn about consent. Children can practice decision-making and problem-solving skills, in addition to learning how their bodies work within the world. In this session, we will review the purpose, benefits, and different types of risky play. We will also discuss ways of becoming more comfortable with the concept and how we are likely already taking risks every day!

Quality Care

This session will show participants what quality care is and why it is so important. Participants will gain a better understanding of what it means to provide quality care and ways to ensure they are providing it for the children who are enrolled in their programs. The impact that quality care has on the development of children will also be discussed.

Quality Environments: FCCERS3 Overview

This training will introduce family child care providers to the Family Child Care Environment Rating Scale. The training will discuss how the FCCERS3 is used in classrooms, why it is important, and how it relates to the Tiered Reimbursement Program in WV. Family child care providers will get a basic understanding for the FCCERS3 and be presented with an opportunity for further training in this area.

Ready, Set, Play! A Simple Guide to Exploring the Areas of Curriculum

This session will provide participants an opportunity to learn the importance of each area of curriculum and how to effectively create centers.

Room Arrangement: Calming the Chaos

In this session, participants will learn about room arrangement and how it impacts the children as a class and individually.

RR Spreading HOPE: Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences 💥

The HOPE (Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences) training will cover the effects of ACEs on health outcomes, the importance of positive childhood experiences, and the research showing their mitigating effects on ACEs. The four building blocks of HOPE will be introduced along with a discussion of type 1 vs. type 2 thinking and ideas will be shared on how to incorporate the HOPE Framework into practice with children and families.

Taking Care of Yourself

This training is a little different than most. Many people may think that to be a good provider you have to be able to care for the needs of the children in your program. While that is true, if you aren't taking care of yourself how can you take care of others? Participants will develop a better understanding of how they can be a better provider just by taking care of themselves first.

The Importance of Family Style Dining in Preschool

Is family style dining something that gets overlooked in your preschool classroom? Do you have a hard time implementing it during mealtimes? In this training session, we will discuss the challenges and benefits of family style dining, how to start incorporating it, and review ideas to support learning activities during mealtimes.

The Rules about Classroom Rules

Do you have classroom rules? Do you go over classroom rules every day, and the children don't follow them? Come to this training session where we will discuss the rules for creating classroom rules and how to set up expectations for your environment that are safe and age appropriate. We will learn how to introduce, explain, and enforce those expectations and discover what the newest research says about classroom rules.

Understanding ACEs: ACEs 101

During this training session, participants will be introduced to the concept of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) through awareness and education. Participants will understand what ACEs are and the impact it has on children and adults, become familiar with the 10 types of ACEs, and gain an understanding of ways to overcome ACEs.

Utilizing the Environment Rating Scale to Achieve Higher Program Quality 💥

This session will include an overview of the most recent versions of the Environment Rating Scales as well as information on how to use the results from the self-assessment to improve program quality through goal setting and the creation of action plans and professional development plans. This training will be applicable to staff and administrators of childcare centers, facilities, and family child care home programs.

West Virginia Infant/Toddler Professional Development Program (WVIT-R)


Professional development is an ongoing process. Trainers and administrators work together to monitor the personal and professional growth of infant/toddler caregivers and help to develop a plan that responds directly to the needs of the children in their care.

West Virginia Infant/Toddler Professional Development Program for Administrators (WVIT-R Admin)

Administrators will get a preview of the training caregivers will participate in throughout WVIT-R. They will also learn about their role in supporting the caregivers in their professional development journey.

Why So Dramatic? The Importance of Pretend Play

In this session, participants will learn about the benefits of pretend play and what materials and experiences to offer in their dramatic play area to help create an ideal learning environment.

CULTURE AND COOKING: CHILDREN'S BOOKS ABOUT DIVERSITY AND FOOD

These children's books about world cultures and cooking traditions celebrate diversity! There are so many reasons we want to teach our children about food from around the globe. Cooking and eating is something we all, as humans, have in common, and it's something kids easily relate to. Reading about recipes and food traditions from other cultures is a great way to teach children to embrace and celebrate differences across race, ethnicity, gender, and appearance.

Reading books about diverse food cultures with children helps them appreciate their own family's food culture and special recipes. After reading, talk about your own family's background and what recipes you make at home that represent your heritage. Although a child isn't having direct contact with food through reading, talking and learning about it in more detail is exposure to new foods. After reading, these foods aren't as scary and unknown, and therefore kids are more likely to try them in the future. Reading about new foods can also encourage curiosity about the world and people of different cultural backgrounds living around us. You have to know what is out there to want to learn more about it. Plus, it is great to recognize the diverse eating styles, religions, or ethnicities of the people living in our own country and communities. Books can provide a starting point for discussing racism and biases that exist in our communities and world and can help children process emotions and experiences. Reading can create an opportunity to talk about judgement that has been placed on our kids for what they eat or how we might judge others.
