An Overview on the Importance of Child Observation and Assessment

In this session, participants will receive an overview of child observation and assessment along with information on why we observe children, the different observation types, screenings, assessments, the benefits, and the tools needed to perform the observation and assessments.

Anti-Bias Education: The Early Years

In this 4-part module series we will be screening the film *Reflecting on Anti-Bias Education in Action: The Early* Years followed with a discussion on how to put anti-bias work into action. There is not a one-way approach to anti-bias education, however we will learn about the 4 interconnected goals that will help guide the work, with each session exploring one of the goals of anti-bias education: identity, diversity, justice, and action.

Block Play: Building Up the Whole Child

This session offers participants the opportunity to learn the importance and value of block play in early childhood as well as some creative DIY ways to make their own blocks.

Building a Firm Foundation with TRAILS One Block at a Time

In this series for family childcare providers, participants will receive an overview of the West Virginia Elements of Family Child Care Series. There are four 1-hour sessions that discuss how children grow, organizing a program, how children learn, and building relationships. ***There are technical assistance visits in addition to the sessions to support learning**.

Building Environments and Activities to Engage Children

This session will help teachers understand how certain aspects of an early childhood classroom confine children's minds, bodies, and souls. Teachers will learn to identify these structures in their own classrooms and develop tools to build environments and activities that engage children on all levels.

Building Strong Foundations: Supporting Infants and Toddlers through the West Virginia Early Learning Standards Framework: Infant/Toddler (WVELSF I/T)

This course will provide an opportunity to explore the WV Early Learning Standards Framework for Infants and Toddlers. Each class will discuss the purpose, content, application, and benefits of the learning standards, as well as how to incorporate each domain into a lesson plan. Participants will gain a detailed idea of how the early learning standards work, basic understanding of observations, and individualized lesson planning and how to incorporate them into a complete group weekly lesson plan for infants and toddlers.

Burn-Out: Recognizing the Signs and Reducing the Symptoms

This training looks at the causes of employee burn-out, identifies the symptoms, and offers suggestions to overcome.

Communicating with Parents in Family Child Care

This session will provide participants the opportunity to learn the importance of regular, respectful, and effective communication with the families in their programs. Discussion will include strategies for positive verbal communication, safe virtual communication, and multiple forms of written communication.

Dealing with Conflict

Are you constantly dealing with conflict in your classroom? Do you feel that all you are saying is, "No!" and "Stop that!" Do you spend a great deal of time resolving conflict in your room? If so, this training is for you. During this session, participants will be introduced to the definition of conflict from a child's perspective. We will discuss various struggles that are occurring in the classroom, and together, we will deliberate problem solving strategies to assist with those classroom conflicts.

Emergency Preparedness

In this training session, participants will discuss the different types of emergencies that could happen, learn the importance of planning and preparing for those emergencies, and how to protect children and staff during and after events. Participants will receive support in creating the required emergency preparedness action plan. ***There is a 1-hour TA visit required to receive full credit.**

Emotional Literacy: What's the Big Deal About Feelings Anyway?

Understanding emotional literacy can help a person in multiple ways. In this session, we will look closely at the importance of emotions and discuss different perspectives, development, and strategies that could help with big emotions happening with children and caregivers. Taking this session will help providers understand that all emotions are valid and that emotions are another form of communication.

From Milestones to Stepping Stones: Knowing is Half the Battle!

This session will give participants a better understanding of child development and developmental milestones, and the importance and benefits of tracking them. Discussions will include what children should be doing at each developmental age and how knowing this information can benefit the child, the teachers, and the parents.

Hands-On Play Party! A DIY Guide to Sensory Play

In this session, participants will learn how sensory play enhances learning in early childhood, as well as learn easy DIY activities to help children explore the world through their senses.

Head, Heart & Hands: How Process-Focused Art Supports Early Learning

In this session, participants will learn how process-focused art encourages and supports development across all domains of early learning, and how to implement it in their curriculum.

Mind in the Making Overview & Module Series

Mind in the Making integrates the science of children's brain development and learning. In this training, caregivers will be guided through an in-depth study of MitM's 7 Essential Life Skills showing ways to immediately strengthen executive function skills in children.

NAEYC Code of Ethical Conduct

This training will go through the NAEYC Code of Ethical Conduct and Statement of Commitment and why it is important to the early childhood field.



"No, Stop, Be Careful!" Why Children Need Risky Play

Simply saying the words "risky play" can make some people nervous. However, risky play is something children are designed to do. When children can take part in risky play, they may experience new emotions, self-awareness, and even learn about consent. Children can practice decision-making and problem-solving skills, in addition to learning how their bodies work within the world. In this session, we will review the purpose, benefits, and different types of risky play. We will also discuss ways of becoming more comfortable with the concept and how we are likely already taking risks every day!

Planning Your Professional Growth

This training focuses on professional growth of early education providers and how to identify goals for the future.

Play is the Work of Childhood

In this session, participants will learn the importance of play in early childhood and get tips on creating a quality play-based program.

Preschool Child Portfolios

Do you want to learn how to create a preschool portfolio for the students in your classroom? In this training, participants will learn the importance of keeping a portfolio for each child. We will discover how to start the portfolio process, track the child's development in several different learning areas, and learn to stay on track with managing the portfolios. This session will also include guidelines for recording, organizing, reflecting, and using anecdotal notes.

Quality Counts

Why does high-quality childcare matter? Because the need for quality childcare has never been greater! But what does it look like in our state and how can we help? Through group discussion and the use of media, early childhood educators will examine program supports that are necessary to achieve and maintain quality childcare and the important role they play within the process.

Self-Care: What Does it All Mean?!

Self-care. It's the new cure-all buzzword, right? We've all heard about it and for the most part we know that it sounds important. We probably have heard some things that we "should" do. As natural caregivers, we often find ourselves just giving to others all day long, both at work and at home. How are we supposed to have time to take time for ourselves? In this session, we will discuss the meaning of self-care, different types of stress, the difference between unhealthy coping behaviors and self-care, and that self-care is NOT selfish.



Fall Leaf Cutting Tray

This easy fine motor activity helps little ones truly get their hands on the beautiful colors of fall. Take a nature walk and help the children gather a variety of colors and sizes of leaves. In your learning space, set up a cutting tray and go over some basic scissor rules and safety tips with your little ones (even if the scissors you give them are not sharp). For this to be really successful, offer a variety of different types of scissors, because not all scissors are created equal, and some will undoubtedly work better on the leaves than others. Happy snipping!

The 5 W's of Lesson Planning

This training will focus on lesson planning: what it is, the planning process, who is involved, and the information that needs to be included on each plan. This training will also look at the differences between an individualized plan and a group plan.

The Growing Brain: From Birth to 5 Years Old

This module series explores brain development of infants and young children from birth through age 5 in the context of relationships. Participants will investigate language and executive function and how the two are related. There will also be discussion of how relationships and attachment affect development and behavior and participants will discover how play positively affects children in all areas of development.

Understanding ACEs: ACEs 101

During this training session, participants will be introduced to the concept of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) through awareness and education. Participants will understand what ACEs are and the impact it has on children and adults, become familiar with the 10 types of ACEs, and gain an understanding of ways to overcome ACEs.

Understanding Infant and Toddler Behaviors: Why Do They Do the Things They Do?

This session will dive in to the five possible causes for behavior with infants and toddlers. Participants working with the infant and toddler age group will reflect on different aspects of behaviors and reactions to those behaviors. We will also look at social emotional development and examine the importance of adapting to the child and their cues.

Understanding Trauma: Reaching the Unreachable

Before we can try to bring healing to those who need it, we must first try to understand how trauma works. This two-part series will discuss trauma and how it impacts a person, how to build a relationship with relationship-resistant children, and general strategies to help increase the learning and healing process.

** Adults and children with trauma may need professional help. What will be offered are ways to make your classroom or home as emotionally safe as possible. **

Utilizing the Environment Rating Scale to Achieve Higher Program Quality

This session will include an overview of the most recent versions of the Environment Rating Scales as well as information on how to use the results from the self-assessment to improve program quality through goal setting and the creation of action plans and professional development plans. This training will be applicable to staff and administrators of childcare centers, facilities, and family child care home programs.

MINDFULNESS Activities to do In Fall with Kids



GRATITUDE HAND TURKEY

Trace you and your child's hand for hand turkey. Have your kids write one thing they are grateful for on each feather

MINDFUL FALL WALK

Find somewhere you and your kids can go for a walk to see their fall colors! Practice mindfulness by noticing all the colors and details around them.



BRAIN DUMP FALL LEAVES

Cut out fall leaves together. On these leaves, have them write down all of the thoughts going on in their head. Gather them up and throw them into the air!



JACK-O-LANTERN JOURNALING

Draw or print some pumpkins. At the end of the day, have them draw and color a face on the pumpkin to match how they felt that day.

PUMPKIN SPICE MEDITATION

Prepare a pumpkin spice hot cocoa for you and your kiddo. Meditate with your attention on the taste & smells of the cocoa.

Sensory Activity: A Walk Through Fall

This fall, instead of offering a traditional sensory bin that children explore with their hands, give them the opportunity to take off their shoes and socks and explore with their bare feet! Fill several bins with different sensory items from nature such as dry corn, sand, crunchy leaves, round stones, pine cones, pumpkin mush, and wood/bark. Ensure that the bins are big enough so that 2 little feet can easily fit inside them; set them up so that children can step easily from one bin to the next. As they walk, encourage children to use their words to describe the way each different item feels on their bare feet.

The pumpkin bin can be messy, so consider placing it at the end of the walk so that children don't track pumpkin mush through the other bins. Also be aware that pumpkin is quite slippery, so be sure to walk next to the children and hold their hands as they take this exciting sensory walk. At the end of the walk it's a good idea to have a bucket of water to rinse the children's feet and a towel for drying them.

Fall Charcuterie Board for Kids

- **Spreads:** Hummus, jams, dips, and nut/seed butter. Add spoons to small dishes to encourage little amounts.
- **Crackers:** Mini cheese sandwiches, goldfish crackers and pretzel thins. Crusty bread and melba toasts would be good too.
- Fruits: Fresh berries, grapes and mandarin oranges. Dried apricots, raisins and apple slices are also fun.
- Vegetables: Baby tomatoes, mini cucumbers, sliced carrots, celery, pickles, and olives.
- Meats: Salami, pepperoni, sliced turkey and ham. Bundle on toothpicks for easy feasting.
- **Cheese:** Cubed cheddar and swiss, mozzarella pearls and string cheese. The milder the better on this kid friendly platter.


